The Wynd books follow a boy named Wynd. The world around him calls people who have magic in them "weird bloods". He has to hide, (because he has magic in him) with his adoptive family, hoping that one day he might live a normal life, not having to hide his ears behind his hat, and maybe getting to go on a date with that gardener boy he knows. Book One the Flight of the Prince, follows Wynd, along with a few others who must leave their home of Pipetown, to attempt to save themselves, and the world around them from the blood laws. They are chased and hunted by the King's men, as he is the one who wants to keep "The last settlement of man" alive. As the crew learns about the world outside Pipetown, they also learn about themselves and each other.

I generally enjoyed Wynd. It has another 4 books in its series, the fourth of which is coming out in December of 2026, and I intend to read it when it comes out. I read a lot of fantasy, and Sci-fi, and just general fiction, and I think this book is good. The world building is interesting, the art is great, and there is good lgbtq+ representation. I think people who like the idea of seeing a group of teenagers go across the world trying to find a place to belong, along with maybe taking over a kingdom to abolish the blood laws, and an interesting story along the way.
